

"preaching means more than handing over a tradition; it is rather the careful and sensitive articulation of what is happening in the community"

Preaching & Teaching is not simply the conveying of Biblical Truths. Rather, it is the creating a climate of awareness within our souls.

> This awareness is to prevent numbing to our human condition and the condition of the outside world.

¹⁷ Jesus came down from the mountain with them and stood on a large area of level ground. The **Disciples**:

Are searching for something.

Willing to be near the unclean to find it.

The search/journey lives in each eternal moment called "<u>now</u>". Pausing from LIFE to listen to something out of character.

The Whom:


Seem to be content that they are well. Seem to be apathetic to others. Seem to be living in a false reality. Be wary of becoming such a person.
